#### "the Doer," Long Over Due! Do for Dewar

OTTAWA -- Marion was born in Montreal and she attended primary and secondary school in Buckingham, Quebec. During her student days, she dreamt of becoming a scientist, but not one of the political kind. Much to her surprise, she ended up graduating from St. Joseph's School of Nursing in Kingston in 1949.

With the words "I do," Marion married Ken Dewar, in 1952. Ken was a patient in the Ottawa Civic hospital when they met. She remained working as a nurse in the Ottawa area until 1952, by which time Ken had long recovered.

For the rest of the 1950s and into the early 1960s, Marion was responsible for a wide variety of innovative initiatives in the field of household engineering. In other words, she spent 15 years at home, raising four little Dewars. She reputedly lived the traditional life, doing "what was expected" of her. While

cleaning, washing, cooking and changing diapers, she apparently never dreamt of entering politics.

Marion did, however, dream of escaping her household chores and getting on with her other life. Liberated from home, she returned to school in Dewar "the Doer" con't on p. 2

Marion Dewar is a patron of the Coalition to Oppose the Arms Trade (COAT). She has played a key role in many of our biggest public events.

In 1989, Marion was the MC at COAT's huge rally against ARMX, Canada's largest arms trade show. That year, she chaired our "Public Inquiryinto the Arms Trade and Human Rights." In 1991, she moderated our conference: "From War to Peace: An Agenda for Economic Conversion."

Two years later, ARMX was reborn under the guise of "Peacekeeping '93." Marion was active on the steering committee of DisARMX '93, the network which COAT formed to oppose the arms bazaar. Marion hosted PEACEX, the three hour program of speeches, music and poetry, which COAT initiated to counter ARMX. PEACEX included literature tables from over 60 peace, development and environment organizations.

the 1960s and received her Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing at the University of Ottawa in 1969. As if that wasn't enough, she also earned her Public Health Certificate that same year. She then worked as a public health nurse until 1972.

It was then that the idea of entering politics surfaced. After an especially frustrating day, Marion returned home and said to husband Ken. "For two cents, I'd run for council in this town!" Shortly thereafter, Ralph Sutherland, the alderman in their ward, urged Marion to run and, more importantly, advanced her the two cents she required for her campaign. Although Marion refused at first, saving she "knew nothing about politics," Sutherland persisted and eventually Marion agreed. Ottawa has never been the same since.

In 1972, thinking she wouldn't win, Marion ran for the position of Alderman in Britannia Ward. She did win however and then two years later in 1974, with her campaign fund nearly doubled, she won again. Two years later, in 1976, she repeated the success. Then, in 1978 -- you guessed it -- she completed her hat trick!

Tired of her repeated bi-

ennial successes, and thinking that Marion's secret was that she could only win during even years, some faceless Tory bureaucrat changed the rules and called an election in an odd year, namely 1979.

But we're getting ahead of ourselves here. Let's go back to Marion's second election victory. That was 1974, when Marion was elected to the hotly contested Board of Control. She left the closest of eight other candidates -- all men, of course -- a sound 2,000 votes behind!

Then, in 1976, Marion was re-elected to city council. It was on Nov. 13, 1978, that Marion became Ottawa's Deputy Mayor and Senior Controller. That's when they switched to odd years hoping to throw her off. Not easily thrown off, however, she was elected to the post of Mayor of Ottawa with 54% of the vote.

The Dewar's son, Bob. was her campaign manager. And again in the next election, when she was re-elected as Mayor, with an increased majority, Bob also managed her campaign.

In her victory speech, she proclaimed: "All you people who have changed diapers out there, hang in -- you end up with great campaign managers." And how did Ken Dewar feel about two more years as First Husband? "I'm relieved,"

he said, standing quietly in the background amid the Civic Centre hoopla. "She's a fantastic person. I've never seen anybody with the energy that she has."

For most mortals, that would have been enough successes, but no. Marion had to go and get re-elected to the Mayoral post once more on Nov. 8, 1982. She served the Ottawa community in that position until 1985.

During her three terms as Mayor, Marion left her mark on the city and on municipal politics. She eloquently promoted non-profit housing, child care, services to the elderly and disabled, job creation, rights of visible minorities and equal opportunities for women. She spearheaded public participation programs and implemented a municipal freedom of information policy.

When Canada agreed to accept 8,000 Vietnamese refugees, Marion roused enough community support to absorb 4,000 of them. She then challenged other municipalities across Canada to follow suit and the response was amazing. Eventually, Canada's official quota was changed to 50,000.

Marion has long been a strong supporter of many peace and disarmament initiatives. She spearheaded Ottawa City council's referendum on global nuclear disarmament. Ottawa was the first of dozens of municipalities across Canada to hold such referenda.

After leaving the mayoralty, Marion became President of the NDP for two years and a Member of Parliament for Hamilton Mountain in 1987 and 1988. She then worked for the Canadian Council on Children and Youth.

Marion is now the Chair of the Ottawa-Carleton Police Services Board and Oxfam -Canada. She is also on the Board of Carleton University. the Centre for Studies of Children at Risk and the Jesuit Centre for Social Justice. Marion is also a valued supporter of the Lambda Foundation for Excellence and is active in promoting gay and lesbian rights.

Marion is, of course, still active in the New Democratic Party. At the recent NDP leadership convention, Marion was one those who gave a nomination speech for Svend Robinson. Svend and Marion are birds of a feather. Both are politicians who promote mainstream politics of the kind that protect the interests of all sectors of the population. They are not swayed by that small but vocal minority of voters representing special interest groups on the fringes of the community, like bankers, big business executives and land developers.

Three cheers for Marion "the Docr" Dewar!!!

### From Toy Weapons Bazaars to the Real Thing

War is not a game and violence is not fun! Unfortunately, a stroll through most department stores this Christmas might lead one to think otherwise. They've look like miniature weapons bazaars.

These burgeoning plastic arms markets flog everything from realistic-looking toy crossbows and automatic weapons to ersatz tanks and bombers. Kiddie arms emporiums are also barracks for legions of "action figures," like G.I.Joe. As aficionados explain, these "Hall of Fame" figures must be equipped (for an extra fee) with the proper hardware, whether for street-fighting, special operations or full-fledged combat.

What effect do this form of play have on children's values and attitudes and their understanding of personal conflicts, wars, other cultures and our society? Violence is a major feature of children's play, especially boys. How does this form of enculturation impact on children's psychological and social well-being?

Most TV cartoons are



produced by toy manufactures. They are full-length advertisements for products *cum* heroes.

Kids are socialized to see violence as an acceptable, if not preferred, means of resolving conflict. They learn to associate violence with adventure, excitement and fun.

There is one genre of toy weapon which is *supposed* to be outlawed in Ottawa. By-law 141-90, states that "no person

shall manufacture, display, market for sale or sell a replica of a firearm." A firearm replica is "a toy or other object that is not a firearm but might reasonably be mistaken for a firearm." It is ironic that while fake firearms are supposed to be banned in Ottawa, real automatic weapons, are allowed at Ottawa's authentic weapons exhibitions. These arms bazaars are attended by military attachés representing governments which frequently violate basic human rights.

So what's a child to think, or an adult for that matter? Society is spoon feeding kids with a daily diet of toy wars, macho heroes and television violence. There is a local law against playing with realistic looking toy rifles but meanwhile our federal government promotes the export of a wide range of very real military hardware for use in very real wars and repression.

Whether they're playing with toy guns or being killed with real ones, kids deserve more than that this Christmas and so does everyone else.

Lately, he's been laying off workers and I've been confronting him with information about economic conversion from a publication called Press for Conversion! Is this magazine a good source of information? So far, my husband is unconverted. What else can I do?

dom and democracy in the underdeveloped world.

My defence company was recently rewarded with a multi-million dollar subsidy from the government to develop missile systems to export to our ally, Turkey. My wife says the government's priorities are wrong and our tax money should be spent to preserve social programs and to develop environmental technologies.

We're arguing a lot lately. She has become involved with an organization called the Coalition to Oppose the Arms Trade (COAT). They're filling her head with crazy nonsense about peace and disarmament and, for all I know, women's lib! What can you tell me about COAT. I'm really worried, I think they've brainwashed her.

Worried

#### Dear Worried:

You're the one who's brainwashed, not your wife! COAT is a national network of individuals and organizations which began by organizing opposition to ARMX '89, a weapons bazaar where your company probably exhibited its deadly wares. After months of public education and political pressure by COAT, during the lead up to ARMX '89, Ottawa City council passed a resolution banning all future military trade shows from municipal property!

Since then, COAT has

continued to expose and oppose Canada's role in the international arms trade. They focus attention on military exports to countries like Turkey, which are engaged in wars and the brutal violation of human rights. COAT has made your wife aware that through your "defence" work, you are complicit in aiding and abetting international crimes against humanity and crimes against peace.

COAT also conducts research on various international efforts to promote the economic conversion of military industries, bases and other facilities to civilian alternatives. COAT initiated a successful campaign to save Ottawa's historic Wallis House, which DND was threatening to demolish. It is now being converted to housing.

COAT is now working to oppose nuclear testing and to promote the boycott of products from France. They're also working on war toys issues and their negative effects.

By organizing events and publishing pamphlets, booklets and their magazine, Press for Conversion!, COAT carries out public education campaigns to raise awareness and to encourage people to pressure the government to change it's outmoded priorities.

If you don't change your own outdated attitudes, you may someday have to choose between your wife and your job.
