Military Aircraft: Symbols with Diverse Meanings

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
ilitary aircraft are more than just pieces of inanimate hardware. They are powerful cultural symbols that invoke incredibly diverse and often strikingly contradictory meanings. In our society, one of the few contexts in which military aircraft are encountered is at so called air shows.

Military Equipment

To the professionals who manage and wage wars, air shows are a valuable opportunity to publicly display the essential tools of "air power." They see military aircraft as practical equipment that is central to the success of almost any military operation. They know that the role of aircraft in warfare has rapidly increased in importance over the past 100 years, and they cherish the chance to showcase their hardware to the public.

Killing Machines

To thousands of refugees who regularly flee to Canada to escape from war and repression around the world, military aircraft are just the opposite. Having been on the receiving end of such weapons systems, victims of war see warplanes as the vehicles that dropped bombs on their communities, or brought invading troops, tanks and other deadly hardware used in the invasion that forced them to escape.

Warplanes are the harbingers of unimaginable suffering. They heralded the injury, disfigurement and death of loved ones, the destruction of ones home, neighbourhood, place of work, schools and hospitals. Indeed, warplanes represent the devastation of one's entire community and the obliteration of ones way of life.

It may seem inconceivable to such victims that Canadians would see such weapons systems without even thinking for a moment about the incredible human misery and suffering that these devices have have spread throughout the world. Military air shows represent another world altogether. To the enthusiasts who attend these festivities, military aircraft are seen as a wonderful source of family fun and entertainment. These annual events showcasing the world's most advanced aircraft. They represent the pinnacle of advanced technology and civilization itself. They just happen to be military planes because the military just happens to have the world's fastest and most graceful aircraft. When spectators see military aircraft perform aerobatic feats, they stand transfixed and mute. They are wrapped in awe and dumb-struck by powerful majesty of aircraft technology.

Air shows are mass public events that are fun for the whole family. Like a country fair, there are lots of people milling about amidst concession stands loaded with cotton candy, souvenirs and junk food. There are often midway rides with free rides for kids. Camouflage face painting and

of air power. In this show-biz atmosphere, military pilots are the star performers. They pose for photo ops next to their planes and, like heroes, they sign autographs for adoring fans.

Military aircraft streak across the sky faster than the speed of sound. They are seen as gleaming objects of art performing high-tech ballet to the sound of rock music. They are the ultimate symbols of fast-paced action, entertainment and a life-style that just can't be beat.

Tools of War and Propaganda

To many who are interested or engaged in peace, human rights, social justice, development, the environment and many other issues, the warplanes exhibited at military air shows call to mind a litary of reasons to oppose war. They were used in countless invasions, interventions and wars that have killed literally millions of innocent people in the past few decades alone. They have destroyed societies, undermined economies and devastated ecosystems. In a very real sense, air shows facilitate an extreme form of holocaust denial. These are strong words, I know, but the reality is that millions of innocent people have been killed during the past fifty years by the same kinds of warplanes that provide family entertainment at air shows.

What's worse, air shows not only hide the holocaust, they shame-lessly turn it into a kind of paradise on earth. Weapons systems are converted into beautiful works of high-tech art. The deadly tools of war become exciting and fun symbols of family values.

Military air shows are such blatant, tasteless examples of propaganda that they invite, indeed oblige, people of good will to respond. Military air shows present our communities with the daunting challenge of confronting the instruments and institutions of war. By coming face-to-face with warplanes, and those who venerate them, we can expose some of the many contradictions that divide our world.
